message:

On-screen text: Prescription opioids can be addictive and dangerous. It only takes a little to lose

a lot.

Ann Marie: My son was 20 years old when he was prescribed opioids.

Mike: I was given a prescription opioid pain medication and within only a few months, I was

completely addicted.

Audio description: Mike walks out of the front door of his house.

Audio description: Brenda looks at a framed photo.

Brenda: There was nobody to tell me that these have a really high potential for addiction. How

could I be addicted and get these from my doctor?

Audio description: Judy holds a framed photo of her son Steve. Close up of the photo.

Judy: My son Steve did not want to die, but his prescription opioids killed him.

Teresa: We lost RJ at 32 to prescription opioid overdose.

Audio description: A photo of Teresa and her brother, RJ, as children.

Noah: It's likely that everybody knows somebody who is struggling with this very problem.

Audio description: Noah walking outside.

On-screen text: In 2020, CDC expanded the campaign with new stories.

Britton: One day, you're serving in the military. You come home, and you're dealing with an

injury. That's when it starts.

Tele: I started using when I was 13. It was like, oh, well, they're medications, they're things that are prescribed to people, so they can't be that dangerous.

Audio description: Tele walks down the street.

Audio description: A photo of Tessa and her newborn baby.

Tessa: I was pregnant, and I had used prescription opioids. I got addicted very fast.

Audio description: A photo of a young Tessa.

Audio description: Jeni stands outside and looks at the snow-capped mountains.

Jeni: I really want to think the first pill was the problem.

Audio description: David stands outside on a bridge and looks at the view.

David: Eventually, finding more prescription opioids was all I was concerned about.

Audio description: Britton walks down the street.

Britton: My addiction got so strong and my opioid misuse and need got so strong.

Audio description: Stevi Rae stands outside and looks at the snow-capped mountains.

Stevi Rae: I couldn't stop. I was pretty bad.

Audio description: Tessa walks her horse into the stable. Tessa embraces her horse.

Tessa: I knew that this was something I had to stop for the sake of my children and for myself.

On-screen text: These latest stories feature a new message: one of recovery and hope.

Britton: Addiction is hard. You have to reach out for help.

Audio description: David walks outside with his family.

David: In recovery, I found my purpose.

Audio description: Tele walks up to a friend and hugs her.

Tele: I have been able to accomplish a lot in my recovery. I just want to be happy. And I want to thrive in my life.

Audio description: Jeni plays an instrument and dances with a group of women at a tribal celebration.

Jeni: In my recovery is when I was like, this is who I am. This is my culture and I'm going to

practice it.

Britton: You get to a place where you're proud of yourself again.

Audio description: Stevi Rae walks across a snow-covered field and looks at the snow-capped mountains.

Stevi Rae: There is hope. Just don't give up.
