Know the signs of an opioid overdose

- Pinpoint pupils
- Slow, shallow breathing or no breathing at all
- Noises like loud snoring, choking, or gurgling
- Limp body
- Unresponsiveness or unconsciousness
- Pale, blue, or cold skin

If you suspect someone is overdosing

- Call 911 immediately.
- Administer naloxone if available.
- Try to keep the person awake and breathing.
- Lay the person on their side to prevent choking.
- Stay with him or her until emergency workers arrive.
