There are several signs and symptoms of breast cancer and one of the ones that folks know the most about, of course, is the lump, but there are others, like any unusual rash on your breast that may be dimply. It could be flaky; the skin could be flaky. Any discharge in the breast, blood or fluid, other than breast milk. The inversion of nipples, any unusual swelling in any area of the breast.

So I really want to encourage young women to know what your breasts normally look and feel like, so that when there is a change that’s unusual, you can follow up with your doctor as soon as possible.
