The Medicaid coverage category includes state-sponsored health plans, including the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP). Children not covered by private insurance, Medicaid, CHIP, public assistance, state-sponsored or other government-sponsored health plans, Medicare, or military plans are considered to have no health insurance coverage. Children with only Indian Health Service coverage are considered to have no health insurance coverage. Emergency departments are excluded as a usual source of care.
