

IV Antimicrobial Starts & NHSN Reporting: Do You Know What Counts?

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Objectives

- Define what qualifies as an IV antimicrobial start in NHSN.
- Identify where the antimicrobial start must occur.
- Accurately count and report qualifying starts.

What is an IV Antimicrobial Start?

- The administration of an intravenous (IV) antimicrobial treatment in an outpatient dialysis setting.
- Must be new or restarted after 21 days.

Where Must It Occur?

Location requirements:

- Must be administered in the outpatient dialysis facility.
- Medications given in emergency rooms, inpatient units, or infusion centers do not count.
- Temporary holding areas within a hospital are also excluded.

What Counts vs. What Does Not Count?

Does Count

- A brand new start
- A restart of an antimicrobial course after 21 days of the conclusion of the previous course
- Continued administration if treatment started in the hospital

Does NOT Count

- Continuation of an antimicrobial treatment if the 'restart' occurs within the 21day period
- Oral antibiotics
- Antimicrobial flushes

How to Count Multiple Starts?

 There must be greater than 21 days from the end of one IV antimicrobial course to the beginning of a second IV antimicrobial start for both starts to be reported as separate dialysis events, even if different antimicrobials are used.

Handling Unusual IV Antimicrobial Start Situations

Restart scenario:

- A patient stopped cefazolin on June 1 and received it again on July 10 at your dialysis facility—this counts as a new start.

Transfer scenario:

- If a patient receives a dose in the hospital and the physician orders the treatment to be continued, **this counts as a continuation**.

Precautionary dose scenario:

- A patient receives a new IV antimicrobial start at your dialysis clinic before any culture results—this counts if it meets the 21-day rule and is not a continuation.
- Must be authorized by nephrologist or by a licensed provider.

Common Errors to Avoid

- Counting oral antimicrobials
- Including hospital only administrations
- Reporting maintenance doses multiple times
- Forgetting the 21-day restart gap

Reporting Tips & Reminders

- Double check the 21-day restart rule.
- Verify administration date and medication name.
- Confirm the medication was administered through an IV.
- New IV antimicrobial in dialysis outpatient unit is reportable.
- If the IV antimicrobial is started in the hospital and is ordered to be continued upon discharge, the dialysis facility would report it as a continuation.
- Clarify route and consult if unsure.
