Five-year PHEP Program Vision

Let's take a deep breath! This is a 5-year plan – let's approach it that way!

Future Direction: The Vision and the "Why"

- COVID-19 response fundamentally changed the preparedness and response landscape and the PHEP program
 - Spent many years developing and investing in preparedness capabilities
 - We were building and managing programs, planning and preparing
 - Need more deliberate focus on developing response capabilities
 - Return to the fundamentals of the program- less about grants management
 - Align PHEP focus with CDC focus on agencywide response readiness
- After extensive feedback from recipients and partners, DSLR developed the Public Health Response Readiness Framework for state, tribal, local, and territorial jurisdictions

Public Health Response Readiness Framework

Strengthen risk communications activities

to improve proficiency in disseminating critical public health information and warnings and address mis/disinformation 3

Expand local support

to improve jurisdictional readiness to effectively manage public health emergencies

Incorporate health equity practices

to enhance preparedness and response support for communities experiencing differences in health status due to structural barriers 4

Improve administrative and budget preparedness systems

to ensure timely access to resources for supporting jurisdictional responses

Advance capacity and capability of public health laboratories

to characterize emerging public health threats through testing and surveillance 5

Build workforce capacity

to meet jurisdictional surge management needs and support staff recruitment, retention, resilience, and mental health

10

Prioritize community recovery efforts

to support health department reconstitution and incorporate lessons learned from public health emergency responses

Future Direction: Rationale

- Intended to:
 - Define state, local, and territorial (SLT) response readiness
 - Identify essential components of response readiness
 - Serve as an organizing framework for response readiness activities
- Advance and move the PHEP program forward
 - Adds "new tools to the toolbox"
 - More accurately reflects where we are as a program
 - CDC and DSLR made significant organizational changes to support response readiness
 - Asking partners to also support response readiness
- Other CDC engagement to support preparedness and response
 - DSLR participation in new CDC Grants Governance Board
 - CDC Biweekly STLT Funding Coordination Meeting

Capabilities Standards and Response Readiness Framework (RRF) Relationship

CDC's 15 Preparedness and Response Capabilities are the nucleus of the PHEP program.

The capabilities underpin PHEP recipient strategies to advance **Response Readiness Framework** priorities and achieve excellence in response operations.



Future Direction: Relationship Between RRF Priorities and Preparedness and Response Capabilities

- Not moving away from preparedness and response capabilities
 - Continuum from preparedness to response and recovery
 - Reflects where we are as a program and a discipline; it is not in conflict
- Recipients ultimately decide which areas to prioritize
 - RRF represents CDC's best assessment of elements critical to response readiness excellence
- Critical preparedness activities are reflected throughout RRF
 - Add unique milestones in applicable RRF area in the application work plan
- Examples of relationship between RRF and preparedness and response capabilities
 - Data modernization, laboratory capacity, and surveillance and epidemiological investigation are cross-cutting activities potentially funded by many sources

Future Direction: Relationship Between RRF Priorities and Preparedness and Response Capabilities

- Epidemiology and surveillance, laboratory readiness, and risk communications are essential for response readiness excellence
 - Epidemiology and surveillance are reflected throughout the RRF: All-Hazards Planning, Workforce, Data Modernization, and Local Support priorities
 - May also be supported through other sources of federal and state funding
- Medical countermeasure (MCM) planning is essential for response readiness excellence
 - MCM activities are reflected throughout the RRF: All-Hazards Planning, Workforce, and Local Support

Select Examples of Relationship Between RRF Priorities and Preparedness and Response Capabilities

- Data modernization is critical to response readiness
 - Important for situational awareness and to inform response actions
 - Can be supported through PHEP as well as other sources of federal and state funding
 - Recipients are expected to adhere to all DMI requirements in the PHEP NOFO.
 - Recipients should consider prioritizing funding to this area if capability to support response needs to be improved.
- RRF activities do not need to be funded through the PHEP to be included in PHEP work plans
- Ultimate goal is response-ready health departments

Application Approach: Tips and Tricks

- Five-year strategic approach to planning
 - Budget Period 1 budgets and work plans should be high-level reflection
 - Similar to the Public Health Crisis Cooperative Agreement in that jurisdictions develop work plans and budgets to be modified later
 - Intended to significantly reduce burden in Budget Periods 2-5
- PHEP is dynamic and will continue to evolve
- This is NOT a test do your best and we will do the same
- No extensions to application deadline to avoid lapse in funding
- Administrative preparedness not a new PHEP requirement; however more progress is needed

CRI Expectations

CRI Vision

- Ensure readiness for a large-scale biological event that requires rapid MCM distribution, dispensing, and administration. This must be demonstrated through functional exercises or responses to real incidents.
- Ensure readiness for a priority threat selected from the jurisdictional risk assessments as demonstrated through either the capstone exercise or responses to real incidents.
 - Although not required, CDC recommends that jurisdictions consider risks other than biological threats for the capstone-based exercise to enhance readiness for risks across multiple threats.

CRI NOFO Requirements

- Funding
- MCM capabilities
- Risk assessments
- Multiyear integrated preparedness plans
- After-action reviews and improvement plans
- Risk communications
- Health equity
- Local engagement
- Exercises

Evaluation and Performance Measurement Plan Expectations

- At application, address the data management plan in the Eval and Performance Measure box only under the first activity: AHA-A
- You only need to enter the core information below one time
 - Who can access data and how you will protect it
 - Data standards that ensure released data have documentation that describes collection methods, what the data represent, and data limitations
 - Archival and long-term data preservation plans
 - How you will update the data management plan as new information is available over the life of the project
 - You will provide updates to the data management plan in annual reports
 - For more information about CDC's policy on the DMP, see the Data Management and Access Requirement on CDC's website

Evaluation and Performance Measurement Plan Expectations (continued...)

- At application, you may enter TBD for all other activities in the Evaluation and Performance Measurement Plan text boxes
- Deadline to provide details for the evaluation and performance plan for each activity is December 31st, 2024

Administrative and Federal Requirements

- No expectation to tie all of these to budget activity
- If there is a cost associated with an administrative and federal requirement activity, recipients should:
 - 1. determine which RRF area is the most appropriate for that activity
 - 2. add unique milestones for that work

Ready CAMP Update

Ready CAMP

- Goal: Reduce number of systems recipients need to access (PERFORMS, PORTS, On-TRAC, REDCap)
- System launched on March 1 with ~750 external users now having access
 - Two training sessions held week of March 4
- Future releases will continue to integrate components of existing systems and enhance system features
 - Recipient user roles
 - Knowledge Center (On-TRAC Resource Library)
 - Monitoring and technical assistance (On-TRAC)
 - Evaluation (PORTS)
