# Background

## **Executive Summary**

CDC provided funding through <u>COVID-19 Vaccination Supplements 3 and 4</u> to support Immunization and Vaccines for Children Cooperative Agreement funded awardees (i.e., awardees) in implementing and expanding their COVID-19 immunization programs and **ensuring greater equity and access to COVID-19 vaccines** by those disproportionately affected by COVID-19. Forming new and nontraditional partnerships **with community and local organizations** has been critical to awardees' efforts.

As awardees prepare for COVID-19 vaccinations to become part of routine immunization program operations, they can build on their partnership efforts to expand their operational capacity for **improving routine adult vaccination coverage and health equity**. CDC has **summarized themes and characteristics for successful adult immunization partner networks** and developed a success framework and recommended actions to guide awardees in strengthening and sustaining partner networks to support adult immunization programs.

This document reviews the **key elements**, **success framework**, **and subsequent recommended actions** needed for awardees to develop strong partner networks that can have the maximum impact on addressing adult immunization needs and advancing health equity.

## **Defining Partner Network and Partner**

#### WHAT IS A PARTNER NETWORK?

In the context of this framework, a **partner network** refers to the collaboration between an awardee and one or more partners in a jurisdiction working to improve adult vaccination coverage and health equity at the community level.

Partner networks will be unique to each jurisdiction. For example, states may establish partner networks to support activities at the state or regional level, while cities or territories may directly engage community-level organizations in their partner networks.

#### WHAT IS A PARTNER?

**Partner** refers to **internal or external entities** whom an awardee has engaged to work together on the shared goal of improving adult vaccination coverage and health equity.

The relationships may be informal or formal, with partners having varied roles:

- Informal partners are partners who share expertise or resources for a specific purpose without an agreement in place (e.g., participating in an advisory group, sharing jurisdiction-developed resources with their networks).
- **Formal partners** are partners who **enter into formal agreements** (e.g., memoranda of understanding, financial contracts), **documenting their commitment** to work collaboratively to achieve shared goals.

The **types of partners will vary** based on the needs of the communities your immunization program is serving. The next slide shows examples of partners that your program could consider engaging.

## **Examples of Partners**

**Partner** refers to **internal or external entities** with whom an awardee works to increase adult immunization and achieve health equity. A non-exhaustive list of partners is below:

# Success Framework for Adult Immunization Partner Networks

#### Introduction

#### WHAT IS THE SUCCESS FRAMEWORK?

- The framework is a question-based guide that supports awardees in establishing, managing, and sustaining partner networks.
- The framework can guide awardees in **transitioning** new and/or existing adult immunization partnerships into an **organized and collaborative network**.
  - Once a partner network is established, the framework can help awardees to **identify areas for**
- improvement, sustain strengths, or guide evolution of the network.

#### **HOW TO USE THE SUCCESS FRAMEWORK**

- Awardees can use this framework with their partners to best meet their needs. It can inform **strategic planning**, **cooperative agreement application development**, or routine **program management**, among other uses.
- This is meant to be used by jurisdictions at any level of maturity. Users can focus on addressing components of the framework that are most aligned to their current needs.
- The framework is a tool that is **intended as a set of guidelines**, not a set of rules.

#### **Success Framework for Adult Immunization Partner Networks**

The framework **guides users through a series of key questions** that are aligned to the four phases of the partnership management lifecycle.


<u>Instructions</u>: Read the questions in order within each phase, starting with "A. Define Goals and Priorities" and then moving clockwise to the next phase. For any question that the answer is "no" or "yes but could use improvement," reflect with your partners on why that is, and then **move to the "Recommended Actions by Phases"** section to review the corresponding recommended actions.

- **A1.** Do you have a **defined vision** to guide your partner network's goals, objectives, and activities?
- **A2.** Do you obtain **input from an advisory group** to inform partner network goals, objectives, and activities?
- **A3.** Do you **use data to guide** partner network goals, objectives, and activities?
- **A4.** Do you **collaborate with the partner network** to refine goals, objectives, performance indicators, and activities?

- **D1.** Do you **collect and analyze data** to support partners' progress toward shared adult vaccination coverage and health equity goals?
- **D2.** Do you **use available data** to enhance goals and activities and/or to update the structure of the partner network?

- **B1.** Do you have the **necessary types of staff** to manage the partner network to achieve identified goals?
- **B2.** Do you have the **right partners** in your network to implement activities and achieve the defined goal?
- **B3.** Do you have **secured funding and other resources** to support the partner network in carrying out identified activities, as needed?

- **C1.** Do you have a defined approach to **managing** and coordinating partners' activities?
- **C2.** Do you **facilitate communication** to advance partner network goals and activities?

# **Recommended Approach for Success Framework**

To guide awardees in strengthening their adult immunization partner networks, the framework provides **recommended actions** for each phase of the partnership lifecycle. The recommended actions are organized in order across three levels, with **level 3**representing the optimal level of partner network maturity.

Do you obtain input from an advisory group to inform partner network goals, objectives, performance indicators, and activities?	<ul> <li>See Questions C1 and D1 for additional inputs to inform advisory group discussions.</li> <li>Consider involving advisors with experience working with historically underrepresented populations (e.g., local public health experts, community coordinators, nontraditional organization reps, etc.)</li> </ul>
A3. Do you use data to guide partner network goals, objectives, performance indicators, and activities?	<ul> <li>Consider data measures such as: vaccine coverage, SVI, IIS, HRSA Shortage Areas, County Health Rankings, etc.</li> <li>Confidence consults through CDC</li> <li>Rapid Community Assessment</li> <li>Increasing COVID-19 Vaccine Uptake among Members of Racial and Ethnic Minority Communities (see Appendix A for potential data sources)</li> </ul>

#### Using this framework, jurisdictions could:



Coordinate with mobile vaccination team partners to develop a vision and plan for the mobile vaccination program going forward.\*



**Develop an advisory group** within their Department of Health to share partnership contacts across departments and refine objectives and strategies.\*



Assess data from partner pharmacies to understand and better plan for vaccine distribution and outreach to providers.\*

# Glossary

## **Glossary (A-N)**

**Activity** An actual event or action that takes place as part of a program or partner network (e.g., intervention,

education campaign).

**Advisory group** A group of trusted experts who can provide input on partner network goals, objectives, and activities,

and review partner network progress.

**Awardees** 64 jurisdictions funded through CDC's Immunization and Vaccines for Children Cooperative Agreement

to implement immunization programs.

**Communication channel** A medium or method through which communication is shared between parties.

**Engagement** The extent to which partners are involved in the partner network, which could include the level at

which a partner participates, attends meetings, communicates, etc.

**Funding coordination** Documenting, communicating, and, if needed, sharing or integrating funds from two or more funding

streams to support the partner network's activities efficiently and cost-effectively.

**Funding stream** A distinct source of funds to support program or partner network activities.

**Goal(s)** Statement(s) of the broad impact to which the partner network contributes.

**Impact measure** A type of measure that assesses the extent to which a program or intervention causes a change in an

outcome.

**New and nontraditional partner** A partner organization that has not typically engaged in the partner network and/or the jurisdiction's

adult immunization program efforts (e.g., long-term care facilities, faith-based organizations,

immigrant- and refugee-serving groups, local businesses/retailers, etc.).

## **Glossary (O-Z)**

**Policy** 

**Objectives**A statement that describes the results to be achieved and how they will be achieved. One or more objectives can support addressing a single goal.

**Outcome measure**A type of measure that assesses the specific results that a program or intervention was intended to achieve.

Partner network

Any collaboration between an awardee and one or more partners in a jurisdiction working to improve adult immunizations and health equity at the community level

**Partner management lifecycle** The continuum of all phases for establishing, managing, and sustaining the partner network.

Partner network phases The four stages of an advancing partner network, including A) define goals and priorities, B) expand organizational capacity, C) advance activity implementation, and D) evaluate and learn.

Peer-to-peer learning

An educational method that involves peers (in this case, partners) sharing information and educating each other on lessons learned from their respective activities.

A declared rule, principle, or guideline to which individual partner organizations and/or the partner network must adhere (e.g., organizational mandates, payment structures, reporting requirements, oversight authorities).

**Process measure** A type of measure that assesses activities or steps in a process that lead to a particular outcome.

**Strategy** The partner network's package of goals, objectives, and activities to achieve its vision.

**Vision** A description of adult immunization program if the partner network fully achieved its goals.
