Since the launch of Public Health AmeriCorps, more than 4,700 AmeriCorps members have added much needed capacity to health departments, community-based organizations, schools, and more helping advance more equitable health outcomes across the country.

Public Health AmeriCorps members are at the forefront of solutions to America's health threats, like the opioid epidemic and the maternal health crisis. They're supporting their peers as recovery specialists, connecting young families to critical resources, creating safer communities for young people, and responding to disasters.

Public Health AmeriCorps members often come from the communities they serve, which is vital for effective, culturally competent health interventions. On average, AmeriCorps members are more diverse than the public health workforce at large, are early in their careers, and join Public Health AmeriCorps to gain skills and experience that support their professional development.

Through Public Health AmeriCorps, CDC and AmeriCorps are creating pathways to public health careers for people with diverse backgrounds and lived experience.
