The World Trade Center (WTC) Health Program is a limited federal health care program that provides medical monitoring and treatment for conditions that are certified as related to a member's exposure on 9/11. Members include responders and survivors of the 9/11 attacks in New York, at the Pentagon, and in Shanksville, PA.

THE WORK CONTINUES:

With over 400,000 people estimated to be affected by 9/11, the WTC Health Program is dedicated to reaching all who are eligible for coverage.

What we do:

The Program provides health care benefits for conditions verified to be related to exposure on, or in the weeks and months after, 9/11. These conditions are known as "certified WTC-related health conditions." Benefits include:



Where you get care:

This care is provided through a large network of Clinical Centers of Excellence (CCE) in the New York (NY) metropolitan area and through a Nationwide Provider Network (NPN) across the country.



CCE If you live in the New York metropolitan area, you will be assigned to a CCE.

Members who live outside the NY metropolitan area can see participating in-network providers for their WTC-related health care across the country.



Who we serve:



Survivor

Lived, worked, or went to school or daycare in the NYC Disaster Area, or were present in the dust or dust cloud during or following 9/11.



Responder

Responded to, worked, or volunteered in the response and recovery of 9/11.
